LOSS OF MOBILE LIBRARY SERVICE

Do you want to create a book swap in the village to compensate for the withdrawal of the mobile library services at the end of October?

All users of the services should have received a letter from Herts Council proposing alternative ways of getting books/CDs, e.g.

- 1. A home library service. A volunteer delivers a library book to the housebound person's house.
- 2. Book swaps. A store of books is kept in an accessible place and people come and browse and swap. The library service will provide a one-off starter pack of books and then the stock can be increased and replenished within the community.
- 3. Local transport. There are various ways of getting to a library nearby if you are fit enough.

Some people in Chipperfield feel it would be good to have a location where books suitable for all ages can be exchanged for free.

If you are concerned about a reduction in the access to books and have suggestions, or would like to get involved, please come to a meeting on **Tuesday 13 October** at **2.30pm** and again at **7pm** in **St Paul's Parish Room.** Tea, coffee and cakes will be available.

Please come if you are interested in using the book swap as we need to gauge how much interest there is for this initiative. The vision is to combine the book service with a coffee morning or afternoon tea so that it is a community activity.

Firstly, the two senior teams who play on Saturdays in the Herts County League need a larger social space for after home games. This in turn will help the club in terms of becoming more financially self-sufficient.

There is now a thriving and successful Youth Football Club set up as evidenced in the recent article in Chipperfield News and by the picture showing not only the Chipperfield Corinthians current team but also the potential Chipperfield Corinthians players of the future! A number of the junior teams use the pitch on Sundays and it is hoped that in the years to come they will continue with their football and progress into the senior team. With all the parents and young players involved, the Clubhouse is now simply too small to accommodate everyone, especially through the winter.

There are pressures on grassroots football across the country, and nationally a large number of clubs are closing. Therefore it is vitally important to provide a community facility which encourages and supports village footballers of all ages.

Initial meetings have taken place with the joint committees of the Senior and Youth Teams, who are committed to completing the expansion. An initial meeting has taken place with the Parish Council which, in principle, is also very supportive of the plans. Any such projects take time (proper procedures need to be followed) and delivering such projects also takes money. The joint committees will explore all options in terms of grants from relevant organisations and will undertake fund raising activities but the project will also need funding from the wider community and this is where you may fit in!

The management of the clubs would love to hear from anyone who is able to consider helping the club financially with a donation or legacy of some kind, or with sponsorship or advertising. ST PAUL'S AND HOLY CROSS

October - part of the season Keats described as one "of mists and mellow fruitfulness": a time when we gather in the harvest and take stock. As Michele said about September being originally the seventh month, October was the eighth. Before 1752, New Year's Day was 25 March. In 1752 England adopted the Gregorian calendar which by that time had been in use pretty well throughout Europe for 180 years; even Scotland changed the date of New Year in 1600. So the year changed, and we also lost ten days in September 1752. If you are involved in historical research, it all gets very confusing, as the date of an event is different depending on which calendar is being used by the writer. October is also the time when the clocks go back. If you were to go back to a beach or a known piece of countryside each year for half a century, you would see changes, so even our geography changes. And, dare I say, we change; I don't look like I did 50 years ago.

Our language changes. If you read Shakespeare or the King James Bible, there is a distinct difference from modern usage, especially with the language used by the young. If you go back to Chaucer, as those who were made to study him at school will know only too well, the English language of the 14th century is in places quite obscure.

So time changes, the calendar changes, the world changes, we change, some things more slowly than others. Does anything or anybody not change? Well, I have good news for you; God does not change. He is as certain and steadfast today as he has ever been. In this uncertain life with all its ups and downs, its joys and its sorrows, God stays the same loving God, as Psalm 103 says, "Slow to anger and abounding in love." You can rely on him totally if you care to put your trust in Him. As the words of Chisholm's hymn says "Great is Thy faithfulness, O God my Father, There is no shadow of turning with Thee; Thou changest not, Thy compassions, they fail not. As Thou hast been Thou forever wilt be." It's good to remember this as the nights draw in and we prepare for the cold and damp, because the seasons change too.

In Jesus Christ God does not mind about our past, He knows what the future holds and most certainly wants us to live in His presence in the present. I only wish He would, for once, answer some of my prayers for the future. Come on you blues!

Cardinal Vincent Nichols' recent homily at an International Mass in Lourdes went like this: My brothers and sisters, we come from many different places and speak many different languages. But there are some important words which we all understand and treasure.

The first is the word 'Jesus'. Each of us knows this name. Sometimes we whisper it, sometimes we say it aloud, or sing it. He is our Lord and Master and we want to be with him, to follow him. We are his disciples and rejoice in the name of Jesus, filled with joy because we know He loves us. And we love Him. St Paul proclaimed it when he wrote, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved'.

The second word we know is this: 'Credo' - 'I believe'. We have the gift of faith. This, too, is our great joy. We believe in God our loving Father; we believe in the Holy Spirit dwelling within us; we believe in the forgiveness of sin; we believe in the promise of life everlasting with God in heaven. 'Credo! Today we thank God for those through whom we received the gift of faith. Please think of them now. Their names, their faces. They led us to Jesus; they taught us his words and his ways. We pray for them, whether living or departed. We rejoice that in the family of the Church we are still united with them. The third phrase we know is this: 'Ite, missa est.' Like the first disciples, we too, are sent out. We hear these words: 'Go, this is your mission.' We, in our turn, are to proclaim the name of Jesus, helping others by word and example to come to know and love Him. This is our mission. We accept it with joy!

One last word we all know: 'Amen.' 'Yes!' 'So be it!' 'I will do this!'

My brothers and sisters: Jesus, Jesus. Credo, Credo! Ite missa est! Amen.


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SOUL SURVIVOR

On 15 August around fifty young people from Chipperfield, Rickmansworth and Chorleywood churches travelled to the Bath and West Show ground in Shepton Mallet for Soul Survivor 2015. The festival is run by the church, Soul Survivor in Watford, and is attended by around 8000 to 9000 people each year – and that is just one week. There are weeks A,B,C and a week in Scotland.

During the week there are seminars taken by youth and church leaders on relevant issues that surround being Christian; there are UV parties, silent discos, late-night worship sessions, cafés open all day and into the night, food vans and a large 'tool shed' that sells things like worship music CDs, stalls from Christian organisations and on one afternoon there was a foam party.

The main attractions of the festival are the morning and evening meetings in 'the big top' hosted by Soul Survivor Watford's Mike Pilivachi, Andy Croft and Ali Martin. In these meetings are worship sessions held by international worship leaders such as Tom Smith, where thousands of young people get together to sing and praise God. There are talks from Mike and Andy and international guests and spokesmen



talking about their lives with Jesus and what we can all do to improve ours. Overall, Soul Survivor 2015 was an amazing experience and allowed everyone involved to improve their relationship with God whilst being able to spend quality time with other Christians.

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A QUICK DIP

At last, a lovely sunny day; time to harvest my potatoes. It was warm work so a dip in the swimming pond was just the thing. We had it put in eight years ago and I have loved it. It was joined to the back of the wildlife pond with two waterfalls and three pumps circulating the water between the two. There are a few water plants around the swimming area but the reeds in the wildlife pond, plus some zoo plankton, do all the filtering and cleaning so no chemicals are necessary. Over the years the pumps and the pipe work must have got silted up and, seeing it every day, I had not realised how slow the waterfalls had become. Then two of the pumps stopped completely. The water had not looked quite so clean this year but I thought that was because I had not been so particular about taking out the floating mucky bits with the net. Every time I fished something out, the net was full of tadpoles or newts. Picking these out became rather tedious so I just made sure I swam with my mouth shut! No one else was queuing up for a swim.

By the time the young man from Garten Art arrived with the new pumps the now

standing water looked dreadful. He washed out the pipe work, fitted the pumps and switched on the power. The difference was amazing; the waterfalls going faster than they had in years. In a couple of days the water was clear again; it was a miracle. This morning, as I jumped in, I disturbed a Great Diving Beetle, a male, I think. He was the size of a ten pence piece and as surprised to see me as I was to see him. I think he must have flown to the pond when the pumps were off as they prefer standing water. He was by a waterlily at the side of the swimming area and made a rush for the bottom when he saw me. They breathe air which they are able to store under their shiny black wing cases but this makes diving a bit of an effort. I hope he did not mistake me for a fish as they are fierce predators, gripping their prey with hollow jaws and injecting it with flesh dissolving enzymes and then sucking up the liquid! I rather hope he will fly off now the water is moving more quickly, not least because I don't want him dining on all those newts that I have been fishing out of my net so carefully!

OCTOBER IN YOUR GARDEN

Autumn is here already and soon we will see tree leaves taking on their autumn hues. Berries are appearing on shrubs and the begonias and many perennials are still producing a blaze of colour.

The flower garden. Bedding plants, such as pansies, primroses and polyanthus can be planted now. Wallflowers are ready to plant for flowering next spring. Dig up tender plants, such as fuchsias and geraniums, and take inside to protect from frost damage. It is a good time to plant bulbs, such as hyacinths, crocus, narcissi, tulips and a huge selection of that are in the garden centre at the moment. Tulips and daffodils can be grown in large pots which can be 'planted' in the ground intact at a later date. Daffodils and narcissi an be naturalised in grass areas of the garden. Winter hanging baskets, window boxes and containers should be planted as soon as possible. Cut down untidy herbaceous plants but leave penstemons, grasses and plants with attractive shape to over winter untrimmed. Stake and tie tall plants to save from wind rocking. Large tender shrubs will need protection from frost damage. Dahlia tubers should be lifted and taken inside. Planting can continue until the ground becomes frozen.

Fruit and vegetables. Carry on picking apples and putting into store but do not store bruised fruit as they will rot and the rot will spread to good fruit. Varieties such as James Grieve will not store and should be eaten straightaway. Harvest vegetables, especially marrows, courgettes and outdoor tomatoes before frost can damage them. Root crops can be lifted and put into store or can be left in the ground and covered with polythene topped with a good layer of straw. Plant early onion sets and garlic bulbs. Now is a good time to plant strawberries. Plant the rest of the brassicas as soon as possible. Dig all areas which are not to be planted until the spring, leaving the ground rough so that the winter frosts will break up the clods. Add farmyard manure when digging, except on patches on which root crops will be grown next year.

The greenhouse. Empty the house, clean the glass and scrub the staging and, while the house is empty, fumigate with a sulphur candle to kill fungi and any pests that might be present. Insulate with bubble plastic; then the tender perennials can be brought inside for over wintering. Make sure that the glasshouse heater is working; it will be needed as soon as the frosts arrive.

Lawn and garden. Keep mowing the lawn while the grass is still growing. Spike and aerate and apply a low nitrogen autumn lawn fertilizer to strengthen the grass for the winter that is coming. Level any dips in the lawn using a soil based lawn dressing. New grass areas can be turfed and there is still time to sow grass seed before the soil cools down. Spot weeding can still be done. Feed the birds and give them water, too. The pond will need to be cleaned of weed and leaves will need to be removed from the lawn as well. All plant clippings can go on to the compost heap but do not put roots of ground elder or bindweed on to the heap. Make leaf mould, too.

Events. All the national and local flower shows have finished until next spring but the Royal Horticultural Society still has events in the Horticultural Halls in Westminster. The Harvest Festival Show is on 6 and 7 October and the Shades of Autumn Show is on 23 and 24 October. Details from rhs.org.uk/shows or ring 0844 338 7502.

PEGGY LAZARUS 23 March 1916 – 17 July 2015

Peggy moved to Bucks Hill with her husband Henry in 1973. When they had started their married life in Edgware in 1937 it was like a rural 'village'. So when they moved to Hollymead, Bucks Hill, they loved being in the countryside again and taking part in the life around Chipperfield. Peggy enjoyed gardening, rambling (always with a pair of secateurs to help clear the footpaths), Afternoon WI, friends, family and, of course, music. She trained at the Royal Academy of Music prior to her marriage (violin and piano) - participating in Henry Wood's student orchestra. Later she played regularly for many years in an 'amateur' orchestra in Kings Langley – but best of all for her was organising and playing Chamber Music. Her principal instrument was the violin.

She had high standards for herself and this characteristic marked all areas of her life. She pursued her duties for Chipperfield Care with the same thoroughness into her 90s; and gave lifts to people whenever needed. Peggy also seemed to have an instinct for communicating with young children always having toys and books for the appropriate age, and enjoyed following their progress. Friends and family enjoyed relaxing in her home and garden as she rushed around hostessing. Her kitchen was out of bounds to others! She was always ready to support others, and rarely, if ever, thought of her own needs. Peggy had 3 children, 5 grandchildren and 8 greatgrandchildren. Letters addressed to Granny Peg in Bucks Hill unerringly found their way to her.

Her husband Henry died in 1994, so for twenty years or so she was living on her own. She entertained friends less frequently over the last two or three years, and finally, about a year ago, realised with sadness that she could no longer participate in her beloved quartets. Peggy was always reluctant to ask for help for herself, but at the end of May 2015 accepted the family's advice that she could no longer remain independent. She moved to a care home in Northwood where she remained until her death. She was an amazing role model for family and friends.
