Remembrance Sunday 9 November 2025

Our Remembrance Service will start with the procession leaving from St. Paul's Church at 10.40am and arriving at the War Memorial on the Common at 10.45am. 19 wreaths will then be laid by the organisations that flourish in our Village, including the usual involvement of children from St. Paul's School, the Brownies and this year, for the first time, our pre-school. The Last Post will be sounded, followed by the traditional 2-minute silence. Reverend Sarah will read a prayer, followed by the church choir leading us all in a hymn. The Common road between the crossroads with The Street and Kings Lane and the cricket pitch car park will be closed as usual for the duration of this service.

We will then move immediately afterwards into St Paul's Church, where we hope to welcome as many people as possible who have been with us on the Common, including those families with children. Schools are continuing to work hard to ensure that our children

know what Remembrance Sunday is all about, so we would love it if they could be involved in everything we do that morning. A number of young villagers have kindly agreed to carry out some of the key parts of this special church service.



Richard Edwards 5 September 1934 to 8 July 2025

Richard was born at Ruthin in the Vale of Clwyd, North Wales. The only son of two teachers, Aneurin, as he was always known when in Wales, was a first language Welsh speaker and didn't learn English until he was 7. It was in his early years that Richard first developed his love of music, something that

became very important to him in later life.

Richard always had big dreams and, at the age of 17, he left the quiet life of North Wales for Birkenhead on Merseyside to train as an accountant. From there he moved to London, working initially at Marwick Mitchell (now KPMG), then Holland & Holland, before joining Knight Frank. There he forged a highly successful business career, combining his professional qualities with natural charm, wit, a genuinely kind heart and an unfailing sense of fun.

While in London, a blind date, arranged through mutual friends, resulted in his meeting Lesley and they married in Berkhamsted in 1965, moving to Pinner where their much-loved children, Fiona and Robbie, were born.



In 1977 the family moved to Burford House in Chipperfield, and Lesley's parents came from Berkhamsted to live there too. Richard and Lesley very quickly became part of the community, taking an active role in the life of the village and giving their time and support to many different committees. Richard's roles included School Governor; Chairman of the Village Hall

Committee; Chairman of Chipperfield News; Auditor for the Choral Society; Auditor of the Horticultural Society and Chairman of the Committee organising the Village Day to commemorate the new

Millennium in 2000. He was also an active member of the Royal British Legion, a regular sidesman in church and a skilled bell puller. To continue his love of music, Richard was active in supporting the Church Organ Fund and in funding extra music lessons for the children in the village school.

For many in the village, however, Richard's greatest claim to fame was when in each November he would don a special red and white outfit and tour the village (often on Matilda, a Steam Traction Engine, or in a pony and trap) as Father Christmas before taking his place in Santa's grotto at the Hollyberry Fair.

As well as the local community, Burford House was also very special to Richard and he took great pride in it. He would spend many happy hours in the garden and



every two years, he and Lesley signed up with other neighbours to be hosts for the Red Cross Open Gardens scheme, raising valuable funds for the charity. Then the lawn at Burford House would become home to a brass band as visitors sat with cups of tea and slices of cake. Richard would also be in his element hosting his and Lesley's bi-annual winter drinks party, which over 100 friends would attend at Burford House. Richard was incredibly sociable and loved meeting people at every opportunity. He had a genuine interest in others and his kindness and generosity will be remembered by all who had the pleasure of meeting him

Richard loved to travel and, since retiring, he and Lesley enjoyed many special overseas adventures together, visiting friends and family in Australia, New Zealand and the US, but also heading off to experience diverse places such as South Africa, India, Brazil and Mexico.

Importantly for Richard, he celebrated his 90th birthday in September 2024, attended his grandson Henry's wedding to Katy in April this year and on 12th June celebrated his Diamond Wedding Anniversary with Lesley, his lifelong partner and soulmate.

Richard passed away peacefully on 8th July surrounded by family members. He had lived a full and long life that will leave many happy memories for so many people.

The Treasurer presented the accounts for the year to end March 2025 and was pleased to report that, even without taking into account the generous bequest received from Margaret Prestwich, the Hall was now showing a small "trading" profit of £2,303. Thanks were extended to Mr Simon Gruselle for giving his services as Independent Examiner of the Accounts for the purposes of the Charity Commission.

Benny Michel 6th July 1945 to 11th July 2025

Benjamin Michel, (Benny), sadly passed away in July, a week after his 80th birthday, which he was able to enjoy in the garden with friends and neighbours on a lovely summer's day.

Benny moved into Chipperfield (Little Windmill Hill) in 2001 and

immediately settled into village life. He belonged to a vibrant mix of local clubs including a wine society, book clubs, the Chipperfield Choral Society, U3A, and a local social group in Kings Langley. He gave his time generously to the community, volunteering in several aspects of village life including Chipperfield Care, taking people to appointments and shopping trips, at St Paul's School as a reading helper and collecting for the annual Poppy Appeal. He also contributed interesting articles to the Chipperfield News (interviewing local people).

Benny was one of five children, growing up in the family home at

Harrow-on-the-Hill, and spent most of his working life in the family business. Although Benny never married, he had a special place in the lives of many of his friends' children and those of his niece and nephews.

Genuinely interested in people, Benny was a true listener, and he loved conversation. He found joy in laughter, good company, card games, holidays, singing, gardening and sharing life with family and friends; his social diary was always full. He loved spending many hours tending to his beautiful garden; he had that magic touch with plants and animals. In Chipperfield, he had cats, including Angel, an adopted three-legged feral cat he called "Tripod" and latterly Rosie (who sadly had to be put down recently).

With a keen love of cars, Benny enjoyed road-tripping to Monza in a Jaguar convertible to watch the Grand Prix, go-karting and caravanning extensively throughout the UK and Europe.

Benny was Chair of Little Windmill Hill Road Association for a number of years and also Social Secretary. He was the most hospitable host and organised many events over the years, including Safari suppers, the summer barbecue, and Christmas Party.

If choosing your neighbours were an option, Benny would be at the top of everyone's list.







ST PAUL'S AND HOLY CROSS

It seems crazy that we are already in November; nights are drawing in and whether the heating should be on is open for debate. The 'C' word has been mentioned in my household and I've already had the 'don't you dare' conversation with my eldest as she tried to set the car radio station to one which only plays Christmas tunes!

And yet, there is so much about this month where we need to slow down and pause to reflect. November is the month to remember. On 2nd November, we celebrate All Saints Day during our Sunday morning services, giving thanks for all the saints who lived exemplary Christian lives and in the evening, at our service of All Souls, we commemorate those whom we have loved and lost, remembering all they brought into our lives. This allows us the space to be still and quiet, to remember those dear to us and to support our own healing, holding special memories and loved ones close again as we remember.

On Remembrance Day, we honour those who made the ultimate sacrifice for us through their acts of service in war.

It may feel that we enter November and the season of Remembrance sombre, with heavy hearts and, especially this year, I do indeed feel that way, with conflict and tragedy persisting across the world. Yet, as I think of those I will remember at this time, and the pain they would feel at the current state of our world, I realise that our remembering shapes us, our future and the future we hand to younger generations.

The love and encouragement of those we remember on All Souls has shaped the love, strength and determination of our everyday lives. The stories shared with us as children by our families and, for some of us, stories from more recent conflicts, is why we gather as a community, united to honour those known and unknown to us on Remembrance Sunday.

As a child, a special delight was visiting my uncle and hearing his stories of bravery and kindness as a POW. I remember holding a small, hand-crafted trinket box, gifted to him for his 21st birthday with an engraved message from other POWs made from bottle tops, and polished to shine like silver -

a light, an encouragement, a gift of love in a time of darkness, a gift of hope for a more peaceful and just future.

The act of remembering is powerful. Not only does it bind us together, through the pain of loss or the encouragement of love and kindness, but it also reminds us that we are called to be people who live 'in remembrance', not for just one month but every day. It reminds us to live in such a way that we build better futures.

Remembrance is not just about the past; it's also about the present and the future. In these times of uncertainty and conflict, we need to remember to maintain hope: for an end to violence and division, for the safe return of those who are far from home and for the healing of wounds, both seen and unseen. We hope for a world where the lessons of the past guide us away from intolerance and hatred towards lasting peace, love and acceptance.

Through the teachings of the Bible, we know that hope is active not passive. In the Old Testament book of the prophet Micah, we are told that the Lord God requires us to live justly, to love kindness and to walk humbly by His side. In his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells us that we will be blessed as we bring peace. We are called to work towards peace, justice, and reconciliation in our own lives and within our communities. Our faith teaches us that, even in the face of despair, hope can be a powerful force for change, the light in the darkest of times.

So let us gather this month in Remembrance to give thanks and to honour. Let us also live in that remembrance through the following months until we gather again as bearers of hope in our parish and as individuals. Let us reach out to one another, especially to those who may be struggling with the weight of current conflicts or loss, and offer comfort, support, and a listening ear to help kindle the light of hope in the darkest of times. Together, as a parish community, we can be a beacon of light and a source of hope-filled inspiration for a world so in need of peace.

OUR LADY MOTHER OF THE SAVIOUR RC CHURCH

November is an emotional time of year, a month that invites us to stop for a while and remember. It is a season when the days grow shorter, the nights get longer and the weather grows crisper and cooler. It's a time when we give thanks and pay our respects to those who have gone before us. In our church, a basket will be placed in front of the altar for people to place the names of those loved ones they want remembered and prayed for during the month of November.

Whether it is All Saints Day, All Souls Day, or Remembrance Day and Sunday, this time of year focuses our thoughts. On November 1st - All Saints Day - we celebrate all the saints, both those canonised and those who are unknown. There are many saints whose names we instantly recognise because they let Jesus work in their lives when they were on earth. Many were horrifically martyred for their faith. Yet we also celebrate and acknowledge the goodness and holiness of ordinary men and women. We give thanks for those generous people who bring God and his love into our lives. All Souls Day on November 2nd invites us to treasure the memories of our loved ones who have passed away and to offer our prayers for God's mercy and peace upon them as they go on their peaceful journey. This day reminds us all of the impermanence of life on earth. An eternal peace prayer we often say for those who have died is: "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May their souls and the souls

of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace." Amen. Remembrance Sunday falls on the Sunday nearest 11th November, when the First World War ended at 11am on the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. There is no one left who would have been there to witness the horrors of, say, the Somme, Gallipoli, or Ypres. Yet we remember with gratitude the many who have given their lives in the service of their country. "Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn..." While this day was first celebrated to remember the terrible losses after World War One, today the anniversary is used also to remember all the people who have died in all the wars since, including World War Two, the Falklands war, etc. By their courage and dedication, we enjoy peace and freedom in this country today, but we are well aware that peace can be fragile. Wars that have broken out in the more recent past, and the news that arrives in our homes every day from Gaza, Ukraine, and numerous other places, remind us all too well of the appalling harm and suffering connected with war.

As we ponder and remember during the month of November, may we be moved to live lives that reflect the love of Jesus. It was He who showed us that genuine strength is not found in hatred and warfare, but in love and understanding.

Dear Villagers

At our 16 September meeting, we were delighted to present finally in person our CPC Outstanding Service Award to Mark Jarrad. This was announced at the APM on 6 May alongside Sue Walker's award and is richly deserved by both. Mark and Sue exemplify the fantastic volunteering spirit in the village of which there are so many examples. In this light, a shout out is surely due to Chipperfield Care and their latest initiative, their Coffee Morning and Wellbeing Hub, which has proved most popular with villagers. Do also look at the separate article on latest SANG works on the Common which continue apace, as well as proposed upcoming works. At Council,



we continue to liaise with DBC as well as other affected Parishes on the proposed imminent Central Government funding cuts and how we might best respond. We have also now submitted a request to the Police and Crime Commissioner for separate funding for improved road safety measures, notably installation of additional Speed Indicator Devices on the village's key arterial roads. The Most Fruitful Year Ever?

Could this be the most fruitful year ever? I certainly can't remember a year when every tree and bush has borne so much fruit. Not everything has done well though. It was a very bad harvest for arable farmers, the dry spring and long hot summer taking its toll on all cereal crops, but anything growing on a tree or bush has done exceptionally well. For the first time in years, I had plentiful crops of plums, every one of the apple and pear trees has been loaded, and I have even harvested walnuts.

The walnut tree has always produced plenty of fruit, but in other years squirrels have arrived like a gang of bandits and pinched the lot before they were anywhere near ready. Usually I get woken at 5 in the morning as squabbles break out in the tree. Often the whole tree seems to quiver, as anything up to a dozen squirrels will be grabbing the nuts before running along the fence with their booty. But this year the green outer casings started to split open and nuts began to fall to the ground with no sign of bandits. I collected a boxful before I went off on a few days holiday. When I got back, something had been splitting open the shells on the drive and

there were none left on the tree, but I am enjoying fresh walnuts with my breakfast granola for the first time ever.

Generally speaking, I have seen very few squirrels this year. I mentioned it when I went on a Royal Forestry Society walk a few weeks ago and everyone said the same. The best theory put forward was that the wet



winter had delayed their breeding and, instead of raising 2 or 3 litters of young, they had only managed one. All the foresters were delighted at this as they do so much damage to trees of all sorts.

It is also a great year for fungi; the woods are full of all different shapes, sizes, and colours. I don't know enough to harvest any for the kitchen, but I love taking photos of them. Better to have apples, pears and walnuts with my breakfast than a dodgy mushroom that I mistakenly think might be edible! Wendy Bathurst
